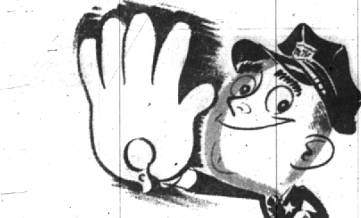

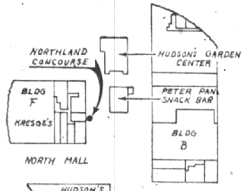

FIRST PUBLIC SHOWING IN THIS AREA

This exhibit in miniature is a faithful reproduction of the original Buffalo Bill show as it toured the country at the turn of the century. Hand-carved in a scale of one-half inch to the foot, it is the result of years of research and over five years of building and assembling.

Research materials, early photographs, and first-hand information for the spectacle were furnished by the famous partner of Buffalo Bill, Pawnee Bill (Major G. W. Little), prior to his death some years ago.

The show is complete with all necessary departments—show, concession, dining, blacksmith shop, stables, ammunition department, wild west arena, Sioux Indian village, and show train. Featured are Buffalo Bill, Sitting Bull, the famous medicine man, and chiefs American Horse, Red Cloud and Iron Trail. There are mounted groups of cowboys, cowgirls and rope spinners; also a mule pack train, bucking horses, steers, buffalo, prairie schooners, old Deadwood Stage Coach, and Auntie Oakley herself.

Reproduction of an early poster for the exhibit, which required over 30,000 pieces to build and assemble, will be on display in the Concourse Monday through Saturday, July 29 to 31. There is no charge for admission. Enter the Concourse from the main entrance on the east end of Building F—see map above.
