Mr. and Mrs. Harold F. Kallfleisch, of Beausoleil spent last week vacationing at Glen Lake.

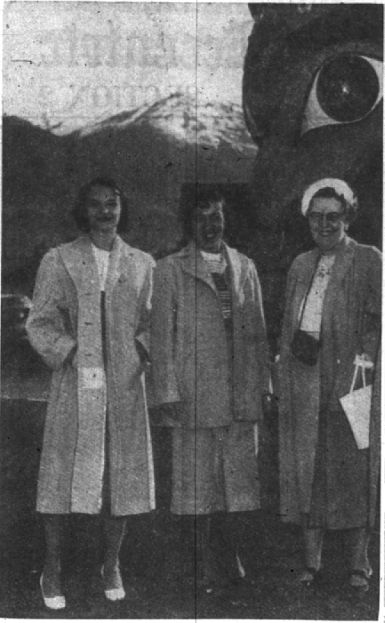

Germany, Holland Leading Europe In War Recovery

Returned to their home at 500 N. Glenhurst last week after three months in Europe, Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Nordstrom said they were most impressed by the job of rehabilitation done in Holland and Germany.

The couple traveled through France, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Holland, Belgium and England. To get a closer look at the several nations they rented cars "and took off" in each one.

Nordstrom said that getting into the average foreign car made him feel something like an elephant, but added that the vehicles handled nicely.

He said that in Holland they were constantly amazed at the way the battered little country had restored itself to pre-war standards.

"GERMANY IS coming back very rapidly in the sections we saw. France is slower, but is pushing right along in the industrial field," Nordstrom cited the Renault automobile company, employing about 55,000 persons. Current output is 800 cars a day, with a probable 1,200 in the near future.

In England, recounting experiences of the war years, one man told the Nordstroms that for six months he grabbed a few moments sleep when and where he could. He was serving with the group which guarded unexploded bombs until demolition crews could remove firing mechanisms.

"We are lucky to live in the United States," Nordstrom declared. "When we came back, on the Queen Elizabeth, we actually saw persons who had been abroad for several months, burst into tears at their first sight of home, the Statue of Liberty."

Mrs. Costello served as secretary of the national group for eight years and for the past two years has been national Panhellenic conference delegate. She has also been national vice president in charge of extension.

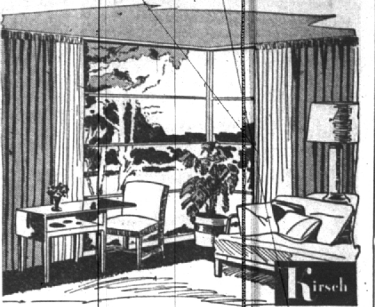
