NATURE NOW Opening Woods Cabin Is Spring Highlight

We were early on our way to spend our first weekend of the season in the "north woods." Those who frequent this familiar highway each have their own estimates of where the "north" begins.

But the "North Woods" is composed of many ingredients. Let us say it has no set boundaries but begins somewhere between Standish and West Branch, at a point where the air is pungent with sweet fern and bracken, where cedar and pine gradually intrude among the hardwoods and where the trunks of paper birch stand chalky white in the morning sun.

Beyond West Branch a range of wooded hills looms up in the distance. The road rises and falls and the intervening bays are filled with leatherleaf. The black bear keeps well hidden within the confines of the cedar swamps that are topped by tall spires of balsam fir.

As the speedometer checks off the miles, varied garden spots of orange daisy, orange hawkweed and purple violet make a fast moving panorama of the roadside. But where these game plants escape into the meadows they become ubiquitous.

King of Royal Oak, Stanley Krajenke of Detroit was ring bearer which largely supports the state's conservation program.

Until the turn of the century this area was deeply wooded with a climax forest of red and white pine. After lumbering denuded the land and repeated forest fires leveled whole sections, the state moved in with a large scale forest management program.

As a result, several million acres of waste-land dotted with blackened stumps are gradually being transformed into beautiful state parks, forests and recreation centers, Michigan now leads all states in reforestation and ranks third in forest management.

If you make a detour three miles north of Grayling on a road branching eastward you will come to Hartwick pines, another landmark of our camping days. With an area of 8,676 acres it is our largest state park in the lower peninsula.

High rolling hills built up by glacial action overlook this stand of virgin red and white pine; a remnant of the great trees which covered the land before the lumberman carried his axe into the north woods.

MANY TIMES, before the area became a park, we made our overnight camp in this fragrant pine forest. Many times have we stood under the greatest of its trees—"The Monarch" white pine retelling the splendors of the old lumbering days for a group of campers crowded around the base. Its height is 155 feet, its diameter, 31 inches.

As we travel on, Otsego Lake stretches itself out along the road like a wide and irregular band. Here in its southern flats the famous AuSable river has its beginnings.

At Gaylord our road turns westward through rolling farm country. Here we exchange the pines for forests of hard maple. This tree is at once useful and beautiful from its first running sap in March to its moving color in October. Here, in mid-afternoon, two does still preyed by winter's demands moved cautiously out into a way-side clearing to feed.

A sharp range of high hills borders the Boyne Falls country known to winter sports lovers for its ski resort. From the top of its charcoal which operates winter and summer one can see west into both Lake Charlevoix and Lake Michigan and north over rolling hills to the beaches of Petoskey and Harbor Springs.

ANOTHER SHORT and winding drive over country roads through apple orchards and low hills and we have reached our destination in the deep beech-maple forest on the shores of Walloon Lake. Shaped like a fringed boot it has 34 miles of picturesque shore line. The unused path lies sudden under the skeleton leaves of last year's growing.

Branches of the rich ground cover of American yew are tipped with blackened stumps are gradually being transformed into

AROUND THE cottage Canada Mayflower and foamflower are still in bloom and the blue of wild forget-me-nots surmounts the untended grass grown rank and tall. Winter winds have winnowed a pile of dead leaves on the porch and the hand fitting the key into the lock trembles a little.

The front shutters come off to let all the expanse of lake and sky into the familiar room. There on the window pane is the imprint of a baby hand left over from last summer's living and suddenly we are at home once more.

The pileated woodpecker are back at their drumming-stand on the old dead tree on the ridge.

My husband's "find" for the weekend — a Brewer's warbler, rare hybrid between the golden-winged and the blue-winged warbler.

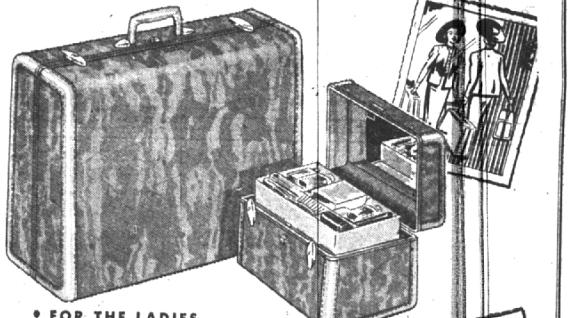

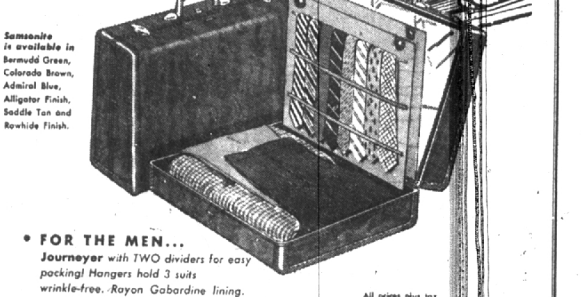
