Among the wedding guests was Nelson Lavergne, Jr., of Yauco, Puerto Rico.

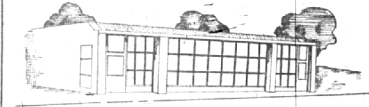
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Former Resident Tells Engagement
