M. M. Shafter of Royal Oak and E. H. Waterhouse of Huntington Woods were named to the operating committee.

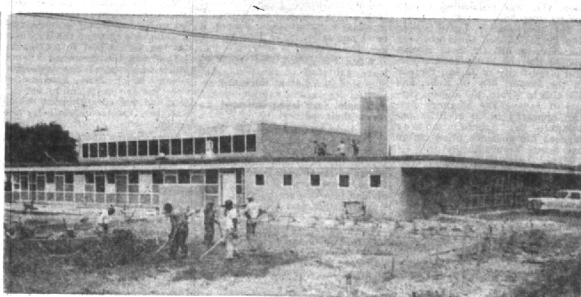

Wallpaper can do all kinds of decorating tricks for you. A room can be made to look larger, smaller, to have a higher ceiling, a lower ceiling, to seem cooler or warmer through your choice of wallpaper.
