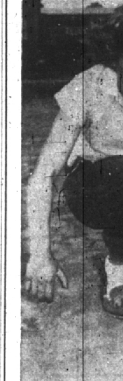

School Elections Monday

Monday, June 14, voters in school districts of Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Troy township and Southfield township will select members of their respective school boards and to decide on ballot proposals.

TWO PROPOSALS regarding the establishment of a special education program for handicapped children by the Oakland county board of education will appear on ballots in all four districts.

TROY and Southfield districts will have no other ballot proposals. Permission to sit Tuscara school and its property at Franklin road and Telegraph is being asked of Bloomfield Hills district.

Election of members to the board of education of Bloomfield Hills and Birmingham will continue with two candidates seeking two vacancies in each district.
