Memorial Plaque For Marc Joslyn To Be Dedicated

Dedication of the Marc Joslyn memorial plaque is set for this afternoon at 2:00 p.m. in the lobby of the high school with seniors and some faculty members present.

The plaque of German silver was designed by Marshall Fredericks, famous sculptor, who also made the main address of the dedication ceremony, explaining the symbolism of the figure of the young knight.

Also included in the dedication service were a prayer by Cherry Harris and an explanation of the reasons for presentation of the memorial by Stuart Scheuffele, friend and classmate of Marc.

The plaque was placed on the panel just outside the door of the high school office. The inscription

and name of winner of the memorial awards are also in German silver.

RECIPIENTS of the awards for 1954 will be announced during the Swing-out program by J. Jay Myers, teacher and swimming coach.

The awards go to the boy and girl in the senior class who most nearly exemplify the qualities of leadership and citizenship personified by Marc. They are fine wrist watches and were presented for the first time at commencement last year.

The memorial was established last spring soon after the death of Marc Joslyn, student leader, who graduated in the class of 1952 after serving two terms as president of Students Congress and making a name for himself as an athlete. He had played center on the football team and was a member of the All-American basketball team.

He enrolled at Williams college but became very ill midway in the first semester and had to withdraw. He died of cancer March 10, 1953.

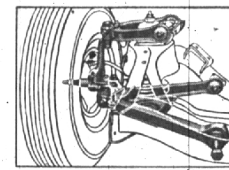

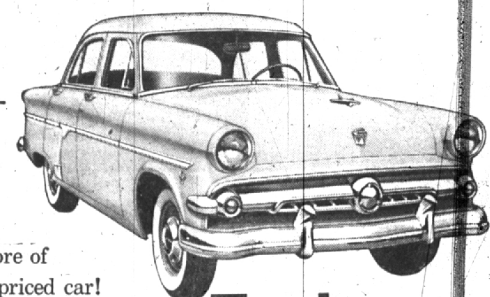
