NOTICE of Annual Election of the Qualified Electors of SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2, Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy, West Bloomfield, and City of Bloomfield Hills, County of Oakland, Michigan, to be Held on JUNE 14, 1954

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Please Take Notice that an annual election of the qualified electors of said School District will be held on said School District on June 14, 1954.

The polls of election will be open from 9:00 o'clock a.m. to 8:00 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, on said June 14, 1954. The place of election will be in the Bloomfield Hills School on Vaughan Road in said District.

The following propositions will be submitted to vote of the electors at said annual election:

1. Shall the Board of Education of School District No. 2, Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy, West Bloomfield and City of Bloomfield Hills, County of Oakland, Michigan, be directed to make sale of the Tawacora School building and Site, which said school building and site are no longer needed for school purposes.
2. Shall the County School District of Oakland County, State of Michigan, come under the provisions of The Special Education Act, which statute is designed to encourage the education of the handicapped children; Provided, that any annual property tax levied for the administration of this Act shall be limited to one-half of one mill?
3. Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in the School District of Oakland County, Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 31, 1932, be increased as provided in Section 21, Article X of the Constitution of the State of Michigan of 1908 for the years 1954 to 1959, both inclusive, by one-twentieth of one per cent (50c per \$1,000) of the assessed valuation as qualified for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of The Special Education Act, which statute is designed to encourage the education for handi- capped children.

Each person voting on the foregoing propositions must be a registered elector in the City or Township in which the elector resides and must be a citizen of the United States over twenty-one (21) years of age, a resident of the State of Michigan for six (6) months and of the School District for thirty (30) days next preceding the election.
