TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the annual election will be held in the School District of the City of Birmingham, in the County of Oakland, and State of Michigan, on Monday, the 14th day of June, 1954, from 7:00 o'clock A.M. to 8:00 o'clock P.M., for the purpose of electing:

- 2 members of the Board of Education to serve 4 years each, and to vote upon the following propositions:
 - Shall the School District of the City of Birmingham, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Three Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,500,000) and issue its bonds therefor, for the purpose of paying the cost of erecting and furnishing a new Junior High School building and an addition to the Senior High School building, and acquiring a site for said Junior High School building and two sites for elementary school buildings, in said school district?
 - Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in the School District of the City of Birmingham, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1932, be increased as provided in Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, for a period of twenty (20) years from 1954 to 1973, both in-cumulative, by a 10ths of 1% (\$400 per \$1,000) of the assessed valuation as equalized for the purpose of paying principal and interest on bonds aggregating not to exceed \$5,000,000 in principal amount, to be issued to pay the cost of erecting and furnishing a new Junior High School building and an addition to the Senior High School building, and acquiring a site for said Junior High School building and two sites for elementary school buildings, in said school district, including the establishment of a reserve for the payment of said principal and interest?
 - Shall the County School District of Oakland County, State of Michigan, come under the provisions of The Special Education Act, which statute is designed to encourage the education of the handicapped children. Provided, that any annual property tax levied for the administration of this Act shall be limited to one-half of one mill?
