Lemon Ice Cream
1 cup sugar
4 eggs
1 pint cream whipped
2 tablespoons flour
4 tablespoons cold water
Juice of 2 lemons and grated rind of 1 lemon
Beat egg yolks light, add 1/4 cup of the sugar, beat five minutes. Then add the lemon juice, water and grated rind. Put into a double boiler and cook until thick as custard. Beat egg whites stiff, add remaining sugar and add the hot custard to the beaten egg whites. Cool. Fold the whipped cream into the mixture. Freeze.

Cucumber Catsup
Pare very thinly 6 large cucumbers, chop finely, add a scant tablespoon of salt and let drain in colander for an hour or two. Add 1 large onion chopped finely, 1 teaspoon of white pepper and 1 pint of vinegar. Stir thoroughly and seal in jars. This keeps well and retains the flavor of fresh cucumbers so perfectly that those who like the vegetable are sure to like the catsup.
