

Early Marriage Helpful to Women In Public Roles

Early marriage and rearing a family is the best training for a young woman who intends to participate in public affairs, Katherine G. Howard, deputy administrator of the Federal Civil Defense Administration, advised 50 Kingswood school seniors at graduation ceremonies Saturday afternoon.

Pointing out that all the women appointed to top government positions by the President are married and have children, Mrs. Howard suggested that the habits of personal achievement are developed in "making good homes, preparing the meals, having babies, doing spring housecleaning and getting the children off to school on time."

Mrs. Howard, who became nationally known through her work as Secretary of the Republican National Convention in 1952, recently served as U. S. representative to the NATO Civil Defense Conference in Paris, the first woman to hold such a delegate position.

After naming six women prominent in government positions, she noted, "The important thing is that all these women were successful wives, mothers and community leaders first before they came to eminence in public life."

She urged young wives to interest themselves in good schools, good community service and good government, adding that "you will never get rich in a monetary way through any of these activities, but

you will achieve something, and the glow of even one small triumph along these lines will light your lives for weeks or even years."

"I think women, and particularly young women such as yourselves, have an innate idealism which makes community service something more than a dry duty," she said, "if that were not so we would have no Community Chest activities, no church guilds and veterans' auxiliaries, no Red Cross, no hospital boards or welfare organizations."

"An unfulfilling promise of future happiness for any young woman, in this modern world of tension, can be found in her willingness to assume the problems of others, as well as her own," said Mrs. Howard.

Enrollment Figures For Troy Schools Declared Correct

A spot check by Oakland county school authorities has found Troy school enrollment reports both accurate and complete, Supt. of Schools Stewart K. Baker said.

In checking 799 of 2,497 Troy students, only one discrepancy was found. In the tenth grade, Troy reported 134 students and investigators counted 135.

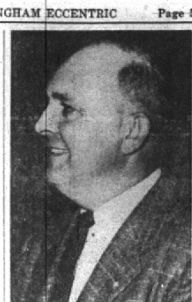

Harlan To Head State Campaign For Korean Aid

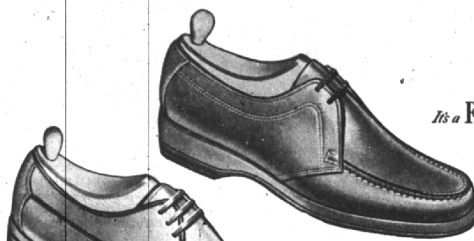
Whether the program will be

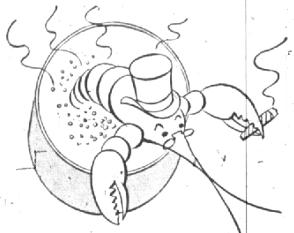

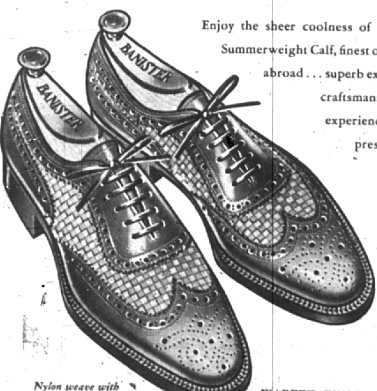
