



### Play Safe; Give Us Room Is BFD Plea

Have you ever noticed how many people follow the fire department to a fire?

There is always a large number of fire fans who go to see the fire department in action. While these people may not be aware of it, they are hindering the fire department in its various duties as well as while responding to an alarm.

State laws say that no one shall follow behind, or park within 500 feet of fire apparatus while it is responding to or working at a fire.

VERY RECENTLY in a neighboring city, a great deal of time and property was lost because spectators blocked streets so that fire apparatus could not get to the fire or hydrant and had difficulty laying fire lines and fighting the fire.

Almost everyone likes to see the department in action, but remember when you see them or hear their sirens pull over to the curb if you can or at least stop so that they may pass without hindrance. Always remember there may be a life at stake.

IF YOU ARE at a fire be sure you leave a lane of traffic open for additional apparatus. Don't park near hydrants making them useless. Keep in mind that it could be your house and you would want the fastest and best service possible.

Remember, when you see or hear the fire department coming to give it room.

### BSA District One Gains New Leader

Ralph E. Piaskowski, Royal Oak, has been promoted to the post of District Executive for District One of the Detroit Area council. He assumes administrative responsibility for all scouting in Oakland county from Bloomfield Hills to Baseline—an organization of 9313 boys and leaders.

Since December, 1952, he has served as assistant to Robert B. Williams, Ferndale, who has now been promoted to a position in which he will head up the activities of five districts in the Detroit area.
