To Resurface Maple
Nearly three miles of Maple road between Livernoid and Dequindre in Troy township will be resurfaced this summer, according to the Michigan state highway department. Bids for construction of the project will be opened at the department's Lansing office Wednesday, June 30. Completion date for this project is September 8.

The seven firemen who initially responded to the alarm were busy conducting the rescue and search. Those volunteers who came on the second alarm six minutes later were personally supervised by Chief Griffith in fighting the blaze.

A special meeting was called for Monday, June 28, to initiate city action for the black-topping of two Lathrup Village streets.
