

Maple Runners Down Port Huron

Breaking two Port Huron track records and winning their first straight dual meet victory of the season, the Birmingham cindermen trounced the Big Red 65-44 last week.

The medley relay team of Bob Libby, Marc Frank, John Appleford and Ron Reuter set a new Port Huron track record of 2:44.5, besting the old record of 2:48.5 by more than four seconds.

Dave Long ran the 880 yard run in 2:15.6, raising the previous half-mile record of 2:13.3. The Maple took eight of 13 first places and clinched the Eastern Michigan league dual meet title over second place Mt. Clemens.
