

7th DA-Y Program June 28 - Aug. 6

The Birmingham Y.M.C.A. will offer for the seventh consecutive year its DA-Y Summer Program starting June 28 through August 6, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., each day, under the supervision of Edwin F. Kibert, Executive Secretary.

Arrangements are now being made for swimming dates to be near by lakes, tours through industrial plants, museum visitations, Craft program, overnight outings at Kennington park, trips to Briggs Stadium, etc. The program is offered for boys and girls eight through 14 years of age.

The total cost includes insurance, transportation to and from individual homes, all fees and admissions, milk at noon and overnight meals. The program will be released April 19 but reservations will be taken starting April 1 for full time boys and girls. Youngsters attending only part-time will not register until May 1.

Parcel 1—Being East of the City Water Tower and Oakdale Street.

Parcel 2—Being a parcel of property south of Parcel 1 which would be included within the limits of Knox Street.

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Bloomfield Twp. Board Approves Subdivisions

Subdivision plats involving 206 acres were approved Monday night by the Bloomfield township board.

A plat of 20 acres on 14 Mile road, west of Cranbrook was approved. Developer of the property is the Wilfred Wikstrom company. The land is divided into 16 lots.

Also approved was the Robertson Bros. subdivision of 146 acres at Wattles and Adams road, as was a 40-acre subdivision by the Kuschel Development Co. on the Sanger property on Hickory Grove road.

Lots in the latter two subdivisions average one acre in size, according to Arno Hulet, township treasurer.

Vacation Delays Bid Acceptance

Date for acceptance of bids on sewer and water improvements in property north of Derby road was postponed from March 17 to March 20 Monday night by Troy township board members when it was found that Birmingham City Engineer L. L. Gare would not return from vacation in time to approve plans for the improvements.

Supervisor Norman Barnard explained that the delay might hurt the Birmingham school district's attempts to begin developing the proposed school site on the property as quickly as scheduled, but admitted that approval of the Birmingham engineer was a must before bids could be accepted.

How Films Help In School Shown At Club Meeting

"New Tools for Learning" were demonstrated to the Kiwanis club at Southfield this week, when William Adecock, director of audiovisual education in township schools presented a film of that title.

The picture will show how this type of educational medium is used in the schools and how classroom benefits can be broadened with them.

This follows the talk last week by Dr. John J. Lee, who demonstrated the use of education, and its needs, in the American democracy.

He pointed out that people of a political state do not have need of education because they choose no leaders and make no decisions.

"Because the masses are not educated, efforts to establish democratic forms of government fail in many foreign countries," he declared.

Approve Participation In Hospitalization

Township participation in the payment of an employee hospitalization plan was approved by Troy board members Monday night and ordered included in the township's budget for 1954-55 to be submitted next month.

Supervisor Norman R. Barnard explained the township would pay one-half of the hospitalization premiums for every employee taking part in the plan. He estimated this would cost the township about \$50 per month.

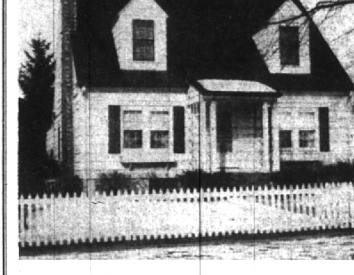

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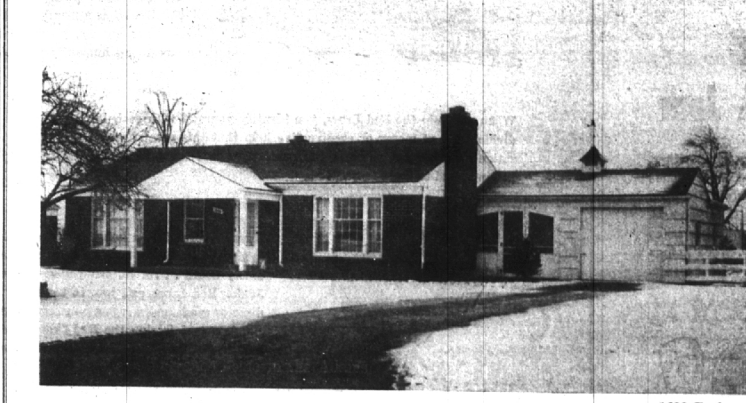
