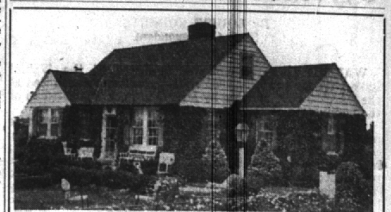

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MARCH MADNESS

Now that the Treasury Dept. has taken its bite we are going after ours.

One of our recent writings said it was a good idea to fertilize the lawn early—before growth begins. This sounded like a good idea so last Sunday we got the job done, (after going to church). What a relief!

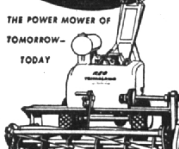
We also read that early bulb shoots should be covered with PEAT MOSS or straw or hay. This we did and Sunday night the temperature dropped below 20.

Now we believe there is a lot of good dope in the ads we write and we are determined to follow our own advice. We have advance info. on some little items we know are going to appear soon so we can start doing them before you can. Here they are:

- As bulb shoots get a good start above the ground, fertilize them with a good BULB FOOD.
- You should prune yew (we mean yews) either before growth begins this spring or at summer's end.
- Burning of grass or plant foliage with a so-called "hot" fertilizer (Vigoro, Agrico, farm, etc.) is a sign of an inept gardener.
- Organic fertilizers are good and highly recommended. DRICOUR is a superb conditioner for gardens, shrubs and small trees. But, its use does not eliminate the need for a stronger fertilizer later on. Incidentally, plants cannot use the organic plant foods until they have been converted by nature into chemical form.
- Cute crocuses continue to come up for years if foliage is not cut off before maturing.
- If peonies blasted last year, spray soil with BORDEAUX as soon as winter covering is removed. Feed with regular garden fertilizer—burn mulch that was removed—thin out clumps—spray new shoots with BORDEAUX on appearing and again in 10 days.
- Feed perennial beds early at rate of 1 pounds to 100 sq. ft.
- Come to store soon—before everything is gone.
- Bargain on 25 ft. lengths of bright, red, all-plastic hose. Were \$5.75—NOW \$3.65. Each length gets 2 doz. tulips (free of cost). (Bacchus) (purple) (not guaranteed) (breeder type) (not many left).
