Tea Cakes, Tried and True

This cookie recipe is over 40 years old, according to Mrs. Harry B. Coen, 1208 Willow Lane, but the cookies are so good she has considered entering them in the Pillsbury baking contest.

Mrs. Coen enjoys baking. She makes cakes by the dozens, cookies by the hundreds whenever her guild at St. James church has a bake sale or bazaar. She is also a member of the Detroit Women's Symphony Association.

While Mrs. Coen likes to try out new and different recipes, this recipe for English Tea cakes is one of her old tried and true favorites.

Besides baking, Mrs. Coen thoroughly enjoys another hobby—that of gardening. She is rightfully proud of her lovely garden and each year the Coen Christmas card shows a different view of the shrubs and flowers when they were in their glory the previous summer.

This year's card showed (in color, of course) a picture of their 50 lilac bushes in full bloom with stately tulips growing beneath the lilacs.

Mrs. Coen's garden, her floral arrangements and her baking have won recognition among her wide circle of friends who consider charming Minnie Coen's ability as tops.

ENGLISH TEA CAKES

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup flour, sifted
- 1/4 cup light brown sugar, packed well
- 2 well beaten eggs
- 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, packed well
- 1/2 cup moist coconut
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Mix well the butter, 1 cup flour and 1/4 cup light brown sugar. Put mixture in bottom of pan 9 x 9 inches and bring up along the sides like a pie crust, so that the filling will hold. Bake 10 minutes in moderate oven.

Mix the remaining dry ingredients. Add the eggs and vanilla and mix well. Pour over the baked crust and return to oven for 35 minutes, baking at moderate temperature, 350 degrees. Cut cookies while warm.

Recipe makes about 25 cookies.

Pantomime To Portray Crucifixion

Under the direction of Mrs. Treasa Way Merrill, members of the Birmingham Women's club, with representatives from the several churches, will present the story of the Crucifixion in pantomime at the Birmingham community house on April 6, at 1 p.m.

Mrs. Merrill has prepared the script which will be presented with a musical background of Bach's "Passion and Mass in B Minor."

"The club is presenting the program as a part of our regular religious service to the community," Mrs. Merrill, past president of the Michigan Federation of Women's clubs, said.

"Each unit is required to have some religious part in the community life, and we can think of nothing better than the opportunity of presenting this, the most dramatic incident in the history of the world."

MEMBERS OF THE Junior Women's club, the modern living department, and other divisions of the senior club will make up most of the cast. With scriptural readings of when the Christus speaks by the Rev. Emil Kottz of the First Baptist church, the group will portray the entire Crucifixion story from the prophecy to the ascension.

Specific scenes will show Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem; the Woman of Bethany; the Lord's Supper; Gethsemane; the betrayal; carrying the Cross to Golgotha by the Man of Cyrene; at the Tomb and the Ascension.

"IN DOING research on this—I've been working at it since last October—I have found this particular incident in history to be one of the cruelest, most horrible things man has ever done to man," Mrs. Merrill commented.

"The very horror of it holds one spell bound. I've tried to capture as much of my personal feelings in preparing the script as possible, feeling that in this way I could perhaps pass it on to the cast and so to the audience."

"Members of the cast have felt it and are revealing it in the way they are handling the scenes. I was amazed when, at one point, one member of the cast burst into tears."

IT IS A story familiar to all but seldom does the whole impact reach us. I feel that in this presentation we will be able to impart these sensations to our audience simply because the players feel them so deeply."

The program, Mrs. Merrill emphasized, will be open to the public.

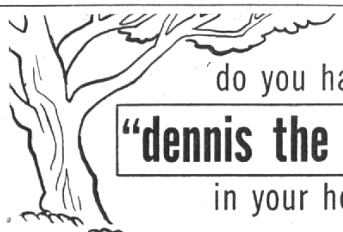
