

Maples Place Seventh In Statewide Meet

Swimming against some of the nation's fastest teams, Birmingham qualified five men and took seventh place in a field of 26 at the class A high school championships last Saturday at Ann Arbor.

Fordson swept to the title for the third straight year, setting three state and two national records. In all, six state high school marks and two national times were recorded.

Second place went to Saginaw Arthur Hill whose divers took first and second place and whose 200 yd. freestyle set a new state record.

Fordson's Ken Geat proved himself one of the nation's best swimmers setting a state and national record in the 50 yard freestyle at 22.9 in the preliminaries. The old national time was 23.2 and the state mark was 23.6. Tom Kwasney, Fordson breast stroker, swam the 100 yards in 1:02.2 to establish a new state record.

Events of the evening occurred out of the pool when a capacity crowd of 2300 each will be awarded to boys in Michigan this year by The American Legion.
