B'ham Police Nab 2 Larceny Suspects In Jewelry Store

Nero, 27, of 70 Alexandria, and Ernie Holleran, 39, of Henry street, were arrested following a tip to police from store owner Lloyd Lake that there were two men in his store that answered the description of two men suspected of having stolen two watches Saturday from Kincaid's Jewelry store, 213 E. Maple.

According to Police Chief Ralph Moxley, the men both have police records in Detroit.

Detectives are checking on the men to ascertain if they were involved in the loss of the watches from the Kincaid store.

Plan Board Okays Zoning Amendment For Parking Lots

An amendment to Birmingham's zoning ordinance to clear the way for the development of commercial off-street parking lots near business districts has been approved by the city plan board.

The board okayed the proposed amendment at its meeting Tuesday night and passed it on to the city commission with a recommendation that it be adopted.

Purpose of the amendment is to clear the way for the rezoning of residential properties lying adjacent to business districts to a classification of parking district.

THIS WOULD allow building of parking lots which could be operated by their owners on a fee basis. It is the hope of the plan board that such lots would make it possible to reduce on-street parking and thereby cut down on traffic congestion in business districts.

The board also adopted a resolution asking the city commission to confer a licensing ordinance to apply to parking lots and urging such an ordinance be adopted concurrently with the zoning amendment. The board stressed the need for such a licensing ordinance to assure that parking lots will be maintained in a manner as not to become a nuisance.

THE BOARD further recommended to the commission that the city's building code be revised to allow a schedule of fees to be set up for building permits for parking lots.

Provisions of the parking amendment requires that lots shall be screened, properly drained and constructed with a permanent hard surface. The zone board of appeals has been given power to modify these requirements in exceptional cases.
