### Buses to Northland Center

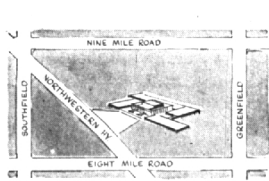
**DSR CONANT LINE** (all buses) starting at East Jefferson and Concord, intersecting Woodward Ave. at State Fair, north to Eight Mile, west to Northland.

**DSR GREENFIELD LINE** (all buses) starting at West Warren and Greenfield and terminating at Northland.

**DSR HAMILTON LINE**—Special buses designated as Hamilton-Northland starting at the Detroit River, following its regular route to Seven Mile Road, west on Seven Mile to James Coxes Highway, terminating at Northland Center.

**GREYHOUND** has two Northland routes: 1st, starting at 9 Mile and E. Jefferson and 9 Mile and Grand, serving St. Clair Shores, East Detroit, Hazel Park, Ferndale, Redford and Farmington 2nd, starting at Royal Oak to serve Royal Oak, Berkley and Oak Park. Time tables available at terminals.
