Baking powder biscuit dough, using
2 cups flour
1-1/2 cups flaked cooked fish
1 small onion chopped
1 green pepper chopped
1/2 teaspoon salt
Milk
Roll biscuit dough to 1/4 inch thickness on floured board. Combine fish, onion, green pepper and salt. Moisten slightly with milk, mix well. Spread mixture on dough. Roll as a jelly roll and cut into 1-1/2 inch slices. Bake on a greased baking sheet in an oven 350 degrees for 1/2 hour.
