Well known in this area for his frequent appearances as organist and carillonist at Christ Church Cranbrook, Maelberghé is a native of Belgium. He began playing the organ in 1919, at the age of 10, his early studies being at Notre Dame college and the Academy of Music in Ostend, and the Royal Conservatory of Music in Ghent.

His first concert tour in this country was made in 1930 and two years later he returned to make his home here and become a naturalized citizen in 1937.

He earned many prizes, awarded in place of degrees in Europe, and since coming to the United States has added several honorary degrees for his outstanding ability as a musician.
