**Barbecue Sauce**  
½ red hot pepper cut fine, seeds and all  
¼ cup salad oil  
1 bottle chili sauce  
½ bottle tomato catsup  
1 garlic clove, chopped fine  
1 cup vinegar  
1 large onion, chopped  
5 bayleaf broken  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 lemon finely cut, rind and all  
2½ cups canned tomatoes  
¼ cup sugar  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce  
Measure ingredients for sauce into a heavy kettle. Cover and cook over low heat for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Put cleaned cooked shrimp into sauce and heat thoroughly, with lid off, stirring to prevent scorching. Serve shrimp and barbecue sauce over hot rice.
