## Cranbrook Institutions Plan Day-Long Founders Celebration

Day-long exercises will be held by Cranbrook institutions Sunday, May 16, commemorating the 50th anniversary of the first acquisition of the Bloomfield Hills property which eventually developed into the 300 acres on which the present six institutions now stand.

Founders of the institutions, George G. Booth and Ellen Scripps Booth, applied the name Cranbrook to their Bloomfield Hills homestead when they acquired the land in 1904. It was derived from the Kentish village in England from which over a century ago Mr. Booth's father, Henry Wood Booth, came to this country.

Exactly 50 years ago this month Henry Wood Booth conducted the first public worship service at Cranbrook in a tent. Today on the same location an outdoor altar has been erected which will be consecrated during a 10:30 a.m. ceremony with members of the present Booth family in attendance.

A SPECIAL Founders Day church service with Cranbrook School headmaster Harry D. Hoy preaching, will be held at 11:15 a.m. in Christ Church Cranbrook. Heads of the various institutions, officers of the vestry, trustees and directors will march in the church procession.

During a simple afternoon exercise a stone tablet will be unveiled in Cranbrook School's "large gymnasium" honoring the late Charles J. Keppel, first assistant headmaster of the School.

A Founders Day tea, for guests and the graduating groups of Kingswood, Cranbrook and Brookside Schools and the Academy of Art, will be held at 3 p.m. in Cranbrook House, home of the late Mr. and Mrs. George G. Booth.

Afternoon visitors will have an opportunity to view 10,000 daffodils planted in the Gardens of Cranbrook House. The daffodils were purchased by friends of Cranbrook in memory of the Founders.

AMONG THOSE to be present at the morning dedication of the outdoor stone altar will be Mrs. Lee Mohr of Kensington Road, Birmingham. Mrs. Mohr's connection with Cranbrook dates back 50 years to the time when Henry Wood Booth conducted the first worship service in a tent.
