Small Fry Birthday Party Needs A Bit Of Careful Planning

Birthday parties for pre-schoolers sometimes prove to be an ordeal for mothers, but there are ways to make them fun. First, try not to have a party until your child is four. At two or three, children are so individualistic that they don't fit well into group activities. At these ages too, mothers must often stay through the party with the children, and while adult talk is going on, children's activities suffer. Try to limit the guest-list to six or seven children, as near your child's age as possible. A group with some two-year-olds and some seven is hard to entertain. Neighborhood children left out because of their ages, can be placated with pieces of birthday cake.

PLAN A short party. Even one hour is long enough for these little ones. Serve the ice-cream and cake first, as soon as guests arrive. That will answer their constant inquiry, "When are we gonna eat
