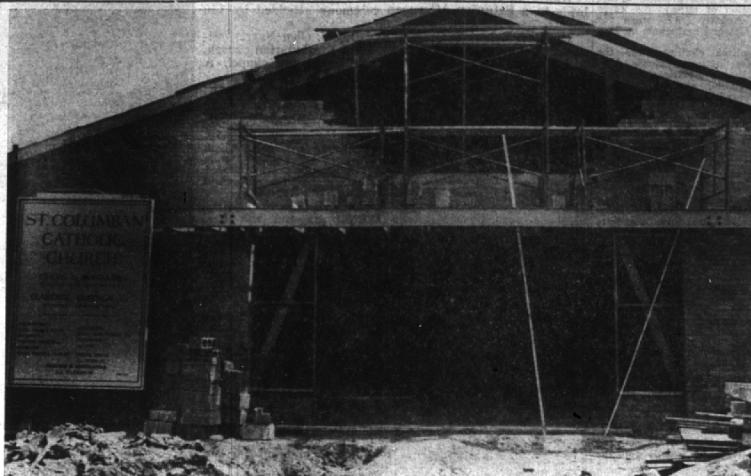
Mrs. Frank Dombrowsky and Mr. Robert J. Neff are co-chairmen of the affair.

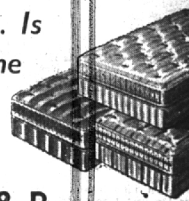
He finished high school at Mercersburg academy in Pennsylvania, and did undergraduate work at Princeton. He spent a year in Korea traveling and teaching in Seoul.
