

Troy Approves Proposed Plat

Approval of a proposed 131-lot subdivision north of the Birmingham city limits and west of the Pembroke elementary school was given the Edward Rose & Son company Monday night by Troy township board members.

The 35 acres to be developed by the Detroit firm originally was owned by Arthur A. Nechman of Birmingham and will be served by water and sewer services granted the property in a joint project between the city and township to enable construction of the school.

A spokesman for the firm told board members that building minimums would be 1100 square feet and that the homes would be brick veneer, three-bedroom homes with car ports.

The area will be known as Troyman Manor subdivision.

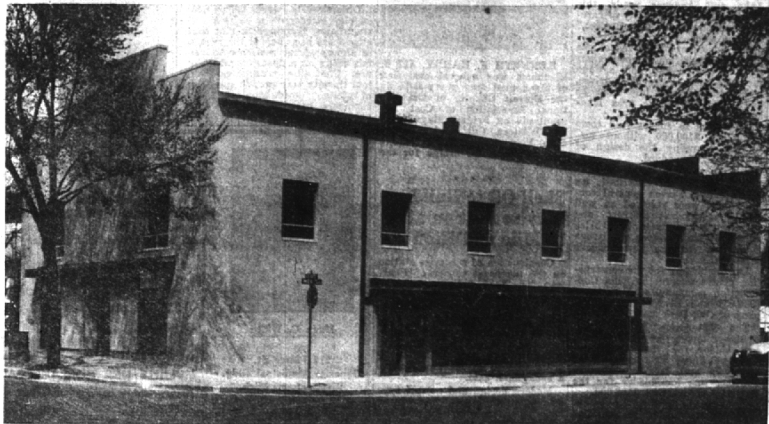
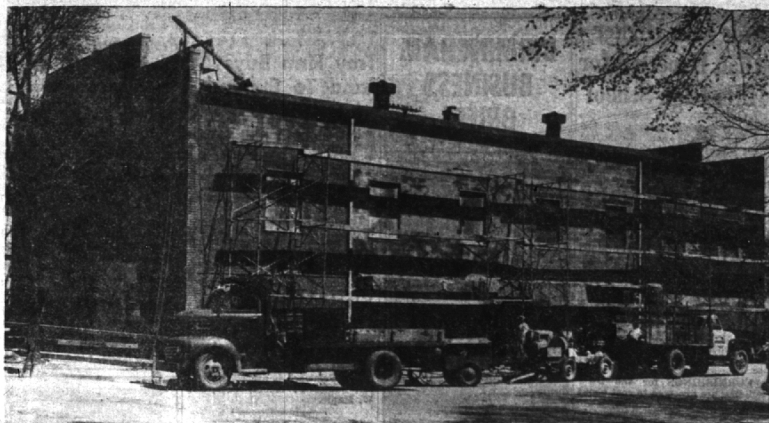

restoration and resurfacing of the exterior walls of the tile building was done by the Western Waterproofing company using a new process called Sprayerite. This is the first time the system has been used in Birmingham for this purpose. Material has been applied up to thicknesses of two inches under 100 pounds per square inch of air pressure.

Y Da-Y Program Offers 7 Weeks Of Trips, Games

A perusal of the Da-Y program of the Birmingham YMCA for the period June 21 through August 6 shows some of the many activities planned which include trips to places of interest, archery, games, swimming lessons, horseback riding, nature lore and fellowship.

Two trips will be Arrowhead Lodge at Kensington Park where the group will stay overnight and cook three meals. Opportunities for nature study will be presented to all besides boating and swimming.

One of the most intriguing trips will be a 30 mile ride on a train through the yards of the New York Central railroad. Boys and girls will be given an opportunity to see a complete "humping" operation, the roundhouse, cars going through the wash rack, and a chance to see the engineer and fireman at work.

A FULL DAY at Camp Ohyesa will give the counselors a chance to work with the youngsters in canoes and row boats.

Trips through the Detroit automobile factories will be taken at intervals during the summer.

The program is so devised that families going away on vacation may register their youngsters for all or part of the entire schedule without their children missing out on special activities.

Little Leaguers Play Ball June 1 At St. James, Eton

Boys who will play on Birmingham's eighth Little League teams were being notified today after managers cut their squads to 15 players at a meeting Wednesday night.

Those boys dropped were assigned to minor league teams. In most cases they returned to squads with which they played last year. The lucky ones had one more practice—Saturday—before major league play begins Tuesday evening, June 1, at St. James and Eton fields. Farm league play will also open Tuesday with games between American and National league squads at Howarth and Torry fields.

Launching of a junior circuit for eight-year-olds this week caused a reshuffling of farm league managers. Three men—Don Outman, Bob Garrison and John Musto—decided to work with the new league since their sons are eight.

OATMAN TOOK over the Trojans, eighth of Pierce school boys while Garrison will manage the Titans, made up of pupils at Franklin, Walnut Lake, Bloomfield Villages and Quanton schools. Musto will handle the Wolverines (Torry and Baldwin) and a new manager, Don Pennell, 2585 Windmere, was assigned to the Spartans (Adams School).

Ned Landis, 2352 Dorchester, replaced Garrison as Bison manager in the farm leagues. George Giles, 17212 Kirkshire, took over the Lions from Musto and Donald Dawson, 1656 Maryland, replaced Outman as Wildcats manager.

A new manager, Ted Moore, 2010 Walnut Lake road, was assigned to the Panthers, a National League farm team composed of boys from the Franklin-Walnut Lake area.

Wabeek Corp. Asks Further Rezoning

Reasoning to the newly created parking district B of one lot and parts of two others on the west side of N. Bates has been requested by the Wabeek Corp.

City commissioners set June 14 at the hearing date on the petition. At a June 7 hearing, the city will consider lots on the east side of Bates to the new parking classification.

Ballot to Include Water Main Permit

A proposal to enable Birmingham as a member of the South Oakland County water authority to construct and maintain water mains through the city from Detroit source will appear on the August 3 primary election.

City Engineer R. L. Gare reported to city commissioners Monday night that an irrevocable permit to use the water mains through the city for a period of not less than 30 years was necessary for sale of the water authority's bonds. This same approval of the voters is necessary for the creation of the proposed Twelve Town Drain project, Gare added.

Contract Renewal Awaits Inspection

A one-month extension on the city's water and fire protection with the Birmingham country club was granted this week.

Before another year's terms are agreed upon, city commissioners asked the fire department to check on the type of materials being used to enclose a club swimming pool now under construction.

Ask Further Study On Water Service

Further study on providing water service for residents on McCune and Dug Scoss in South city night by board members.

Mrs. Charles Wilkins, 2156 McCune, told board members that the Detroit water board would approve water for the area if the township would construct a water main on Lahar to the stricken street, long without an adequate water supply.

Supervisor William Roesser again explained it would cost the township between \$40,000 and \$50,000 to enlarge the present eight inch main from Eighth Mile to McCune street. He reported that the lateral main on McCune alone would cost residents nearly \$2,000.

"Even if we decided to finance this project, we are not sure the Michigan Fire and Marine Insurance Board would approve a bond issue to serve as a down payment," Roesser stated.

Board members agreed that more study be given the project in an attempt to ease the shallow well area.
