We cannot be selfish this morning and talk only of things we want you to buy. We worked some hours in our yard Sunday after taking the little one to Sunday School (and letting him hook a ride home) and ran across some things we feel need attention.

The most important item right now is WATER. A newly seeded area filled in beautifully 10 days ago but now looks badly. We know that the slower germinating seeds sprouted after the ground dried and died on the spot. It is very deceiving because the nurse grass makes you think everything is O.K. "Taint so. Water your lawn at least once a week 3 inches deep.

This goes for new plants, flower and vegetable seeds and new shrubs and small trees. SOAK REGULARLY.

When some growing things seem especially slow—it may be advisable to use a little fast acting fertilizer such as RAPID GRO, NUTRI-LEAF or INSTANT VIGORO.
