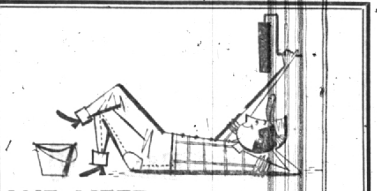
The Alfred Douglasses of Arlington drive spent a recent weekend at their cottage on Saginaw Bay.

## NOTICE

### City of Birmingham, Michigan

### RESTRICTIONS ON USE OF WATER FOR SPRINKLING

Water furnished by the Water Department of the City of Birmingham shall not be used for sprinkling or watering lawns or gardens except as specified herein:

Residences with odd numbered house numbers may use water for sprinkling or watering lawns or gardens on odd numbered days of the month.

Residences with even numbered house numbers may use water for sprinkling or watering lawns or gardens on even numbered days of the month.

Emergency. The use of water shall be further controlled by the Fire Department as follows:

The Fire Department shall sound the siren with a series of 12 consecutive blasts, when in the opinion of the officer in charge of the department an emergency exists. All use of water for sprinkling or watering of lawns or gardens shall be prohibited for a period of two hours after such an alarm is sounded.

The above restrictions shall be effective June 1, 1954, and thereafter until modified or rescinded.

The restrictions imposed hereby are issued under authority of Section 12 (a) of Ordinance Number 365.
