Mr. and Mrs. Edward M. Fischer of Bunker Hill drive spent Easter week-end in Toledo, Ohio.

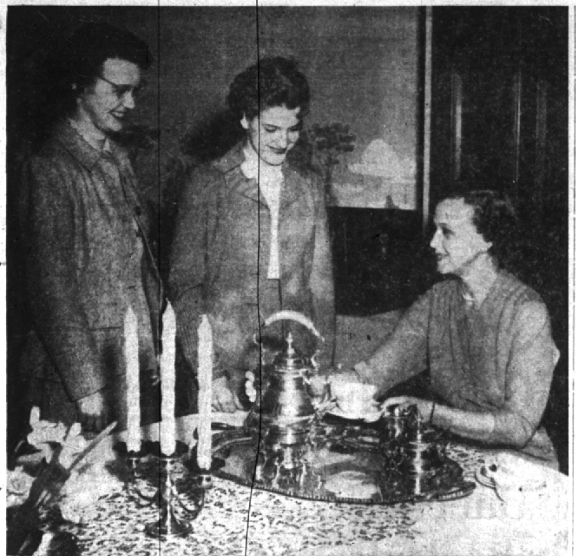
Mr. and Mrs. Marc L. Hagerman of Bunker Hill drive took their two year old son and brand new baby boy to Flint for Easter week-end.

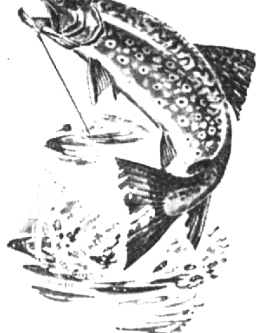
