The Maple track team won its first League victory last Friday at Mt. Clemens, the 641 to 44½, win making the first time the Bathers have been defeated in dual meet competition since 1951.

The winners captured nine out of 13 first places with Bill Dove in the 100 yard dash three times with first in the 100 and 220 yard dashes and as anchorman on the winning 880 yard relay.

Birmingham boys won three of the four field events with Chuck Erickson putting the shot 48 ft. 7 in. and Russ Hibbard clearing 5 ft. 7 in. to win the high jump. Erick-son also won the broadjump with a leap of 19 ft. ½ in.
