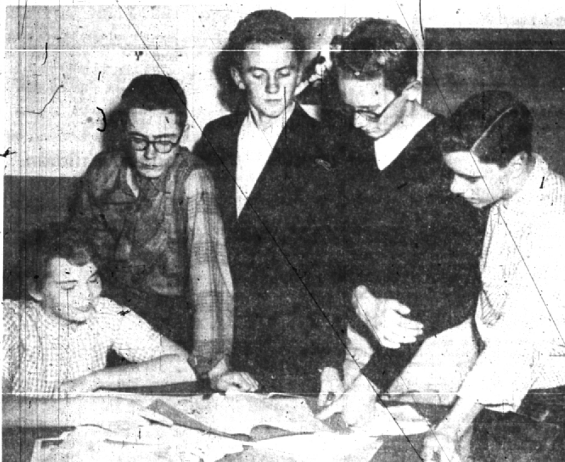

## Maple 11 Readied for Berkley Clash Friday

After a week's layoff, the Birmingham football team goes to Berkley tomorrow night to battle a championship Bear 11, with the kickoff set for 8 p.m. Berkley, already assured of the championship of the Inter-Lakes conference, currently owns a five-win and three-loss record. After dropping the first two contests to Meivindale 20-0 and Grandale 21-10, the Bears come back to take five straight victories before being downed last week by a strong Rochester outfit last.

**COACH LLOYD HUBDEN**, now in his second season at Berkley, employs both the single wing and T formations. The nucleus of the Bear squad is 11 returning lettermen, led by all-state candidate Bruce Lollahan. Big Bruce generally operates as tackle on both offense and defense. Occasionally, however, his 215 pounds are put to good use in the full-back position to gain vital yardage during a crucial point in the game. Also outstanding in the line are veterans Keith Phillips, center; Terry Lewis, guard; and tackle Dick Martin and Bob Cadden. The Berkley backfield, which boasts speed and power, is sparked by quarterback Bill Donahue. Also prominent is Bob Blackwell, who is doing a standout job at halfback after playing last year. The six-foot Bear passing attack is six-foot-five senior end Dick Zanaty, a valuable receiver who also handles the kickoff assignment.
