

Beverly PTA Sets Open House Date

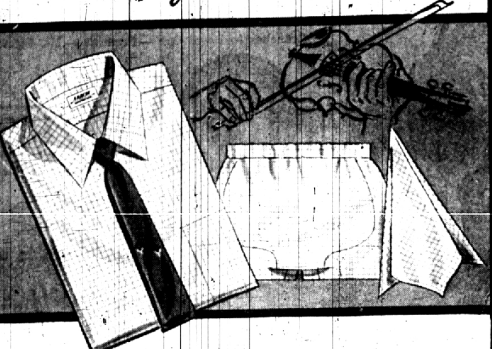
Volunteer Workers To Be League Topic

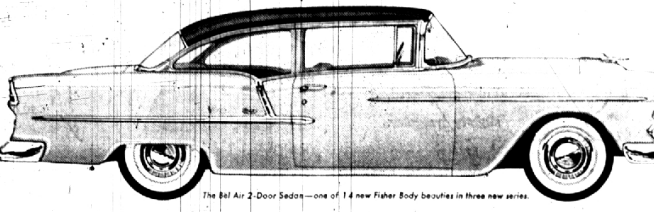
