## Brooklynite to Play At Ascension Church

The appointment of J. David Leichtung as organist at Ascension Lutheran church was announced this week by the pastor, the Rev. Paul Shippert.

Nov. 24, Leichtung has been playing church organs since he started as assistant organist in a small Dutch Reformed church in his native Brooklyn at the age of 17.

A year later he went to Ascension Lutheran church, Franklin Square, L. I., as organist. Subsequently, he played in several other Brooklyn churches.

While at Brooklyn college and playing at Christ Church, he organized his own chorus of college students and over a three year period the group was heard in numerous churches.

Leichtung came to Michigan last year to teach vocal music at Clarkson high school, serving at the same time as minister of music at Greenfield Methodist church, Detroit. Here, under his direction, a five-voice choir presented the entire score of John Stainer's "Credo".

During the past summer he served as organist and chorister at Christ Church in Detroit during the vacation period of Dr. Maurice Garrahan.

At Ascension Lutheran, Leichtung is attempting to design a choir whose function is primarily liturgical. A repertoire of concert music will be built up for presentation on several occasions during the church year.
