WHILE THE SOUTH OAKLAND county incinerator's three huge charging hoppers and un-noticed, spectators at last Saturday's preview of the new building become ensested by the deep caviernat the left. Their attention was attracted by the workings the huge scoop, similar to the one at the top left of the picture, as the crane operator monstrated how garbage and rubbage would be picked up from the manmoth storage n and deposited in the hopper openings to the three furnaces. Representatives from the off the authority \$12\$ member communities met to take a look at the incinerator's cilities before fires are turned on in the giant garbage and rubbish destructor. Com-



pletion of switching equipment and final work on the combustion chambers are the only chores before workmen as a real end of garbage and rubbish disposal problems seem as close as 30 days for the 12 communities that will bring 280 fons of refuse to the incinerator daily once operation is started.
