"How to See What You're Looking At" is the topic which Michael P. Church, supervisor of special projects extension service, University of Michigan, will discuss for the Birmingham Society of Women Painters at 2:30 p. m. in Baldwin library auditorium on Nov. 18.

A lunch, currently being in the center state in his series of discussions on creative art, is working on a Ford Foundation grant which "on loan" from the university.

Based on the fact that there are more than 7,000 artists, professional and amateur, in Michigan, he is seeking ways in which observers may obtain a deeper knowledge and appreciation of their efforts.
