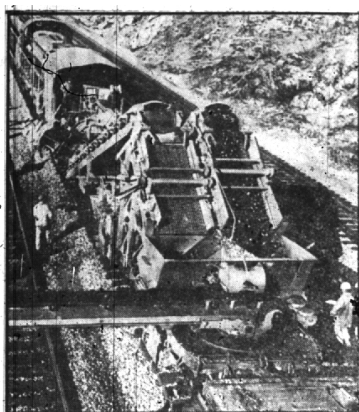

Neil Black, Member Of 1st Volunteer Fire Dept. Here

A member of the first volunteer fire department in Birmingham, Neil Black, 75, of 501 Rutledge, died Monday at his residence following a brief illness. Organized August 1, 1913, the group was known as the Benevolent Association of Volunteer Firemen of Birmingham. Mr. Black served as captain of the only hook and ladder company in existence at that time. There were ten men in each company, the hose and the hook and ladder company, and according to the original by-laws, each man paid \$1 annually to belong to the organization. From December 26, 1918, to Dec. 8, 1919, Mr. Black served as chief of the department. The following years he was captain and lieutenant, which offices were filled by election of popular vote of the organization. Mr. Black served the city for 15 years and two months until he resigned in 1928. Mr. Black came to Birmingham 11 years ago from Okla. A retired decorator, he was a member of the Clawson IOOF and the...

Arthur Carl Peck, Chrysler Official

A Birmingham resident for 30 years, Arthur Carl Peck, 60, of 1010 1/2 W. 11th St., died Monday at his home in Detroit. Mr. Peck was president of the First State Savings Bank of Birmingham from 1913 to 1932. Mr. Peck spent eight years in the office of the treasury bond department at Chrysler. He was married to Mrs. Ruth Spitzer Oct. 29, 1921. Mr. Peck was graduated from Baldwin High school in 1912, attended the American Institute of Banking, Detroit Institute of Technology and the Detroit Business College. He was a member of the First Methodist church in Birmingham, a member of the Elmer A. H. Hunt 242 American Legion and the Chrysler-ABC Management club. Survivors include his widow, two sons, Carl Spencer Peck of Birmingham and Lt. Paul Peck of the USNAR, and four daughters, Mrs. Genevieve of Marine City; four daughters, Raymond, Robert, and Victor, of Birmingham; and Winford of Highland Park, a sister, Mrs. Frederick C. Lattner of Detroit and four grandchildren. Funeral services were conducted Wednesday at Manley Bailey funeral home with Dr. Hays E. Martin officiating. Burial was in Roseland Park cemetery.

Pair Plead Guilty To Simple Larceny

Picks of guilty to charges of simple larceny were entered by two men Nov. 16 when they appeared before Justice John J. Gaff. Frank D. Merhart, 26, of Pontiac, chose 30 days in jail rather than the \$15 fine and \$10 court costs levied against him. His companion, 21-year-old Kenneth R. Spence, also pleaded guilty to the same offense and was ordered to pay \$10 costs or spend 10 days in jail. His sentence was suspended for 60 days. The two admitted stealing a tool box from the Bloomfield theater last week.
