BECAUSE OF our lack of understanding of Russia's low living standard, the effectiveness of U.S. propaganda through Voice of America often amazes the mark, said Mrs. Kirk.

"Why do we talk about refrigerators and television and motor cars," Mrs. Kirk asked, "when Communists promise the people something they really can't understand—a need for every home in the airways to prevent it from being heard than we spend in producing it."

The U. S. should continue its Voice of America broadcasts, Mrs. Kirk believes, and said that the Communists must fear it because they spend more money jamming up the airways to prevent it from being heard than we spend in producing it.

IT ISN'T EASY for a Russian to hear news from outside the Iron Curtain. Only one-third of the 3,300,000 radios in Russia are capable of receiving the Voice of America broadcasts or the Radio of Liberation from Munich.

Many radios are nothing more than crystal sets, she explained, and then, too, one must be in a room alone in order to hear the program for fear of being spied upon and reported to the dreaded secret police.

"The Russian people's greatest fear is the secret police," Mrs. Kirk said, "and this fear enters into everybody's life. Almost every family has had someone taken away to forced labor by the secret police."

OF THE 200 million people in Russia, only a few are members of the Communist party. In order to become a member of this select and elite group, one must start young and go through a rigorous training period of many years before being allowed to join, she said.

Following the morning lecture and the celebrity luncheon at Bloomfield Hills Country Club, Mrs. Kirk graciously answered questions from the audience.

Harry D. Howey, headmaster of Cranbrook School, introduced Mrs. Kirk at both meetings.

She was the second of six Birmingham-Ten Ham speakers. The next will be John Mason Brown, drama critic and author, who will discuss current affairs at his appearance Dec. 10 at the Birmingham Theater.

Auto Inspection Bill Under Study

In preparing for the next H-V legislature at Lansing, December 2, 3 and 4, Shirley Laughton of the Troy Good H-V group, one must make it mandatory for all movable vehicles on state highways to undergo a yearly safety test.

The bill calls for inspection of brakes, wheel alignment, lights, windshields, glass, body, visibility, and stop lights.

Inspections would take place once yearly at certified stations. For those cars qualifying, a sticker would be issued and affixed to the windshield.
