Using cardboard, the pattern, worked out by Mrs. Herbert George of the troop committee includes the floor of the dollhouse with its four walls and roof cut in one piece around it. Painting the outside with white paint gave a glossy finish, but required the Brownies to work on newspapers on the red floor at Scoutleader Mrs. Oliver Rodgers' home on Wimpleton.

Shutters are glued on the outside, a tiny-pattern wallpaper is pasted inside, and furniture is placed within. The furniture, simply styled for these youthful hands, was made of paper boxes with shelves, chairs, or other details drawn with crayons.
