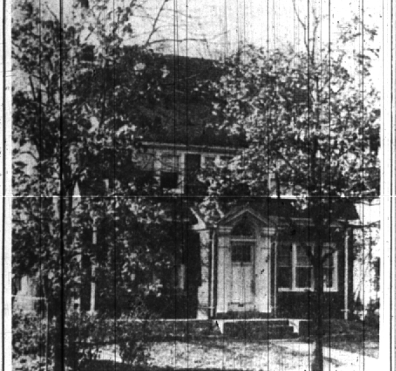
## Maple Swimming Team in Action

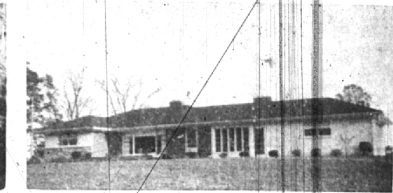

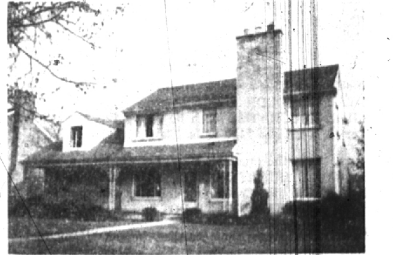

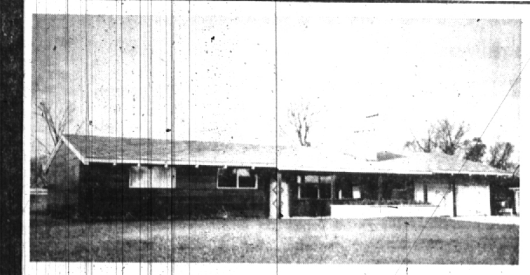
