posed amendment, that the city probably would be subject to possible claims for damages by property owners.

Commissioner William B. Roberts, in supporting some type of enforced spraying program, said: "The way the beetles are spreading these trees, it seems we should spray all of them."

CITY MANAGER Donald C. Egbert estimated the total cost of spraying all trees, public and private in the community, as between \$100,000 and \$150,000, for two preventive spray jobs per year. Commissioner Robert Navin, however, said he did not see why the city should spend public funds in an effort to save privately-owned trees, unless there would be a benefit to the trees on city land.

Vincent B. Watkins pointed out to fellow commissioners that many people would be opposed to a mandatory ordinance, because the spray itself might get on houses or kill certain wildlife.

Commissioner Dean Beer asserted his support of the principle of the amendment but believed administration costs would be prohibitive for a spraying program involving between 4,000 and 8,000 property owners twice each year.

DETECTION of further spread of the disease after the first frost is impossible, he said, since the characteristic wilting of the leaves no longer is visible.

However, he urged homeowners to make arrangements for spraying of their trees early next spring, since he predicted a possibly even greater increase in the infection next year.

Egbert, he said, have found that once the treckilling beetle enters an area, the disease usually increases for the next five-year period.

SINCE THIS is the third season of the infestation in the Birmingham area, Egbert plans to start an even more intensive campaign next summer. About 7,500 of the city-owned elms were sprayed this year by city crews, he said.

Preventive spraying of trees on private property costs between \$10 and \$15-20, by commercial sprayers, while the elimination of a diseased tree may cost up to \$20.
