The recommendations of a commission appointed by the governor to study the present election procedure and to suggest reforms will be analyzed, since it is expected that this commission report will be the basis of legislative action in the next assembly. The program has been prepared by the election law reform committee of the League, headed by Mrs. Dolores Howarth and members of the committee will lead the discussions at the unit meetings.
