Residents of Birmingham will have an opportunity on Wednesday, Dec. 1, to watch Mrs. Chester Cook, nationally known flower arrangement expert, fashion dramatic traditional and contemporary Yuletide designs as a part of her lecture, "Decorating the Home for Christmas."

Her lecture demonstration, scheduled at 2 p.m. at the Birmingham Community House, being sponsored by the Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills branches of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association.

As proof of her ability, one of Helen Wilson's bouquets, "The Joy of Flower Arranging," is devoted to Mrs. Cook's artistic use of natural plant material.

Mrs. Cook spent six weeks last summer traveling to the west coast and Canada gathering material for her current lecture series. In Birmingham she will demonstrate unusual Christmas decorations for formal, informal and is an established radio speaker, lecture-demonstrator on television and the author of many flower arrangement articles.
