

# Port Huron Gridders Subdue BHS, 13-7

The Maples dropped their sixth straight gridders game when Port Huron last Friday 19-7 in the victors' Memorial stadium only because of their spotty offensive attack and erratic defense.

Support all but puller the game out of the five when a resound break-out of 127 yards in three buses led by the Pep club came and jockeyed their way forward to clear the team on. Many more went by the way.

Maple hopes were high when the maroon and white marched the opening kick deep into Huron territory before junior halfback Wayne Giegie fumbled and the Blue Water boys recovered.

**THE BIG RED** tallied first in the opening stanza, following a drive with fullback Dick Turner crashing over from the one. A running play for the extra point was unsuccessful.

With the Maple gridders' spirit dying out, Port Huron drove 56 yards early in the second quarter for the second score. Jim Hines, right halfback, scampered 33 yards for a 12-0 Big Red advantage.

Highlight of the march was a 22-yard pass play from quarterback Lyle McAuley to halfback Doug Hanton for a first down on Birmingham's 25 yard marker. Substitute guard Frank Keeloge booted the extra point for a 13-0 Huron halftime margin.

Birmingham came roaring back in the third period, covering 59 yards in seven plays following a

punt return. Fullback Tom Beck went over right tackle for the final yard and six points. End Bill Watkins expertly kicked the extra point amidst the clamor of hundreds of Maple followers.

**THE LEAGUE LEADERS** punched over still another counter in their making season of the contest when the flashy Turner scurried 40 yards of tackle into the Maple end zone. Keeloge's conversion attempt was not good.

However, before the final touchdown Birmingham almost knotted the score when quarterback Bill Swaney passed successfully for 24 yards to preserve end Don Haugh who made a spectacular catch despite an airtight Huron defense. With less than a minute left in the struggle, Maple fullback Beck received the Port Huron kickoff and dodged all out opposition to give the Maples a first-down on the Big Red 23 yard line.
