To Appeal County Court Decision

SOUTHFIELD—An appeal of a recent Oakland County Circuit Court ruling concerning a rezoning petition will be made in the Michigan Supreme Court, board members decided Tuesday night.

The county of court ruling against the township's denial of a rezoning to commercial on property owned by Harry White on the southeast corner of Telegraph and Eleven Mile. The land stretches 1,600 feet south on Telegraph and is 200 feet wide. The property is presently zoned residential.

A majority of board members agreed that if the local court continues to break down the township's zoning, the entire land use classification in the township will have to be reviewed.

Drive-In Theater Plans Referred

SOUTHFIELD—The township planning board will be confronted with a request for rezoning to permit erection of a drive-in theater by Norman Stern highway at their next meeting.

Township board members Tuesday night rejected a petition of Charles M. Bauerer, 1471 Glenary, Bloomfield Village, to the township's zoning the entire land use of the proposed outdoor theater. The site is on the south side of North-western and west of Lahner road. The property is now zoned residential.

Contract Awarded For Road Surface

BLOOMFIELD HILLS—City Commission Monday night opened bids for surfacing Bathmor road and a part of West Valley and awarded the contract to low bidder, Detroit Concrete Products Co. for \$12,312.25.

About 10 Bathmor property owners present at the meeting indicated they were anxious that the work be completed before winter and were willing to have the contract let with the cost borne by special assessment of the property owners. City commissioners agreed that the city will pay a fair share of whatever has been past procedure. Hearing to form an assessment district will be called later.

Pedestrian, Bike Collide Sunday

BLOOMFIELD HILLS—a 17-year-old student named Love, fleeing across the intersection of Woodward and Long Lake without looking where he was going, knocked a Detroit lassie from her racing bike last Sunday.

Armen Vega, 26, of Detroit was treated at St. Joseph Mercy hospital for cuts and bruises and dismissed. Police said Edwin A. Love was running and looking behind when he stepped in front of Miss Vega, who was thrown to the street by the impact.

Seek Disconnection Of Down Spouts

SOUTHFIELD—In an attempt to relieve further flooding of township homes in areas served by sewers, the board Tuesday night instructed Supervisor William Roemer to investigate the feasibility of an ordinance ordering disconnection of down spouts from sewer lines.

Ask Re-Evaluation Of All Property

BLOOMFIELD HILLS—City Commission Monday night authorized City Manager Elmer Kephart to hire Wilkins Associates of Lincoln, Neb., to prepare a re-evaluation of property for the city tax assessment roll.

Low bidder of three—Wilkins bid \$8,500 for the job. The information will be used in preparation of the city's next tax assessment rolls. Commissioners hoped Wilkins' information would put property in line with its true value.

Pair Stand Mute In Circuit Court

TROY—A Royal Oak man and another from Warren, Mich., stood mute Monday afternoon in Oakland County circuit court and a plea of not guilty was entered for them on a charge of breaking and entering at night.

They are Gerald Noman, 18, Warren, and Roger Richie, 17, of Royal Oak, arrested by Troy police on July 15 for break-ins occurring on July 13 of Forsythe's market of 3969 Dequiner road and Boulton Bar, located at 17 Mile and John R.

Troy Police Chief Dave Groutop said the men had in their possession at the time of arrest a bottle of an alcoholic beverage, 39 packages of gum and \$52.50 in change which they admitted having taken from the places they entered. The men were on bail for grand larceny in Macomb county at the time of their arrest in Troy. They remain there in force in Birmingham. Details as to inspectors' fees will be further stated.

Zoners Recommend Commercial Use At Coolidge-Derby

TROY—Zone board members Tuesday night elected, by a three to two vote, to recommend the rezoning of the northwest corner of Derby and Coolidge to commercial use to the township board.

Property owner, William D. Zuhane, petitioned for the zone change from agricultural to build a shopping center on the property that has a 237 foot frontage on Derby and 500 foot frontage on Coolidge.

The recommendation will go before the township board in the near future despite protests from residents in Penbrook Manor subdivision in Birmingham.

The city commission Monday night ordered a letter sent to the Troy board pointing out that the city could find no reasons to endorse the zone change.

Supervisor Norman Barnard Wednesday morning stated that the township could not handle the rezoning at its next meeting, October 25, but said that action would probably be taken on the matter soon.

City Gets Codes

BLOOMFIELD HILLS—The city got its first building, plumbing and electrical codes Monday when city commission adopted rezoning for all three, closely resembling those in force in Birmingham. Details as to inspectors' fees will be further stated.
