*Paperwhite Narcissi and some yellow paperwhites bloom indoors (in gravel and water) in about 6 weeks.
**Hyacinth will flower in water jars indoors in 8 to 12 weeks. Amaryllis blooms indoors in 10 to 12 weeks. (Not in yet, place orders now.)

A general planting rule for most bulbs is to cover them to a depth of 3 times the height of the bulb.
Be sure to use a bit of BONE MEAL below the bulbs.

IMPORTANT:—
Don't leave leaves on the grass through the winter or you will have plenty of leaves and little grass in the spring.
Don't let your lawn go to sleep more than 1 1/2" high.
