



### Special Musical Vespers Sunday

A special musical vesper service is planned for the First Presbyterian church at 4:30 p.m., Oct. 17. Currently there is a series of vespers from 4:30 to 5:30 each Sunday.

The special service will include presentations by the church quartet, Jean Hohmeyer, violinist, and Robert Slusser, organist and choirmaster.

The quartet will sing "Festival To Beams" by Dudley Buck, and "The Good Shepherd," an Arthur Jennings work. Two soprano solos will be sung by Ruth Killeen, "Come Now, Let Us Reson Together," Stebbins, and "C. Saviour Hear Me," by Gluck. She will be accompanied by Mrs. Hohmeyer.

AS A PRELUDE to the service Mrs. Hohmeyer and Slusser will present several violin and organ numbers.

Slusser's brief organ recital will include some of the works of Bach, Fletcher and Charles Marie Widor.

A brief meditation service will be in charge of the Rev. W. Glen Harris, Ph.D., senior pastor.

### New Church To Operate In Manse

The newly formed Presbyterian church to serve the east side of Birmingham will begin operation on Oct. 31, with services in the manse, 2588 Winderley at St. Andrews.

The Rev. Mac Taylor, assigned to the newly created parish, said worship services and Sunday school will be planned for 10:30 a.m.

Classes for kindergarten through the sixth grade will be held in the basement, with a nursery on the second floor. Worship service will be held on the first floor.

MR. TAYLOR said a survey of the area was completed, and plans were going ahead for the construction of a church building on Big Beaver, just east of Adams road.

"The first unit will, in all probability, be a chapel," he said. "Our plans call for erecting a building which can become the center of future expansion. Dr. Kenneth Nye, of the Detroit Presbytery, is now seeking an architect to prepare plans. It is his belief that we may have our first unit in about six months."

The area assigned the new parish is bounded by the Grand Trunk railroad, Derby, Coolidge and Maple, with approximately 700 families living there.

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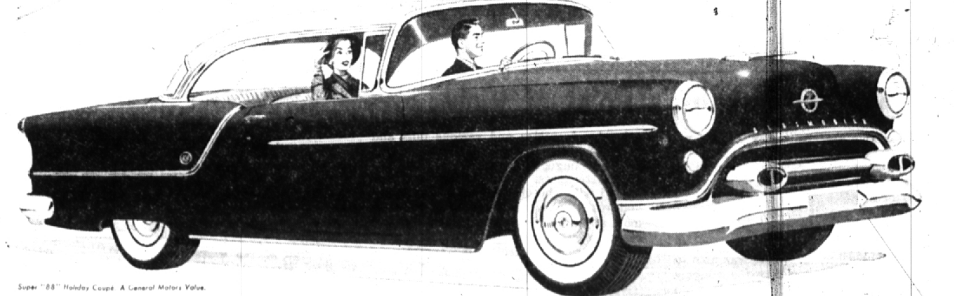
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
