

Ferndale Downs B'ham First Time in 6 Years

An outgout Birmingham team ran into a stone wall Friday evening and was mauled by a title-hungry Ferndale team, 28-0, on the victors' Jefferson field for the first Maple defeat by Ferndale since 1948.

The locals threatened but once and that in the final minutes of the last period after Ferndale had tallied its quartet of touchdowns. Substitute left halfback Stu MacDonald scooted his way from the home team's 35 yard marker to the four, but a clipping penalty on the same play killed any hopes of cracking the goal line to avoid the first Maple shutout of 1954.

IN LOSING, Birmingham's won and lost percentage dropped to .500 for four games while the Maples have yet to emerge victorious in the Eastern Michigan league. Tomorrow night Hazel Park will entertain them at 8:00 p.m. in the Vikings' second league contest.

Birmingham let up in the middle two quarters, allowing the Rail splitters to rack up two touchdowns in each. Only numerous penalties enabled the Maples to hold the Lines scoreless until midway in the second frame.

Line quarterback Ken Brown, one of Michigan's best high school passers, let go with a 30-yard scoring fling to end Tom Turner for the initial score.
