Bad Weather Tags Traveler on Trip

Birmingham's weather for the past few weeks has been old stuff to Mrs. Charles J. Shain, recently returned from an extensive tour abroad. Rain and cold, she reported, dogged the entire trip.

Mrs. Shain recounted her most recent trip abroad for members of the Birmingham American Association of University Women at their luncheon meeting, Oct. 13.

"It is easy," she said, "to stand in some of Europe's famous cities and imagine the people who once walked there."

"History has always been a favorite subject of mine, and as I walked through these places, important in the passage of time and the growth of the world, I seemed to see some of the men and women associated with those early years."

"Other places we visited are those which have been made immortal through art and writing. Poets have made many of them live so that they seemed almost familiar to me as I stopped there."

"Castles, with their remnants of furnishings, told the visitor much of the way people lived centuries ago. Much can be learned and felt during a visit with history."

IN CITING her interest in the history of countries all over the world, Mrs. Shain said that "sevenths of today is history."

Mrs. Shain recounted her trip up the Nile and visits to other historic spots in "Bibleland."

"We were shown the cave where Mary, Joseph and the Infant Jesus were engaged to have hidden to escape Herod's men," she said. "Did they really hide there? Who knows? It's plausible."

"Along the banks of the river we were shown where Moses was found in the bull-rushes. It could be—there were certainly enough rushes growing there."

"But weather true or whether fanciful tales thought up to entrance the tourist, they do add interest to one's trip."

Portugal proved one of the interesting countries on the agenda. Mrs. Shain was deeply impressed with the neatness of the country.

"THERE IS no waste in Portugal," she said. "Every inch of fertile soil is used. Vineyards are utilized to the fullest, and in some cases, grape vines were planted between the rows of orange trees."

Three highlights, incidental to the trip, were related, by the speaker.

She told, first, of the uncanny sensation of flying over heavy cloud formation, just at sunset.

"It was the strangest feeling," she related, "to fly above the sun, the yellow light it cast up from the horizon tinted the huge masses of clouds below us, and the scene became one of fascinating beauty and, at the same time, a forbidding vista."

TWO OTHER incidents, were in a much higher vein, concerned a camel ride to the pyramids and a trip to a salt mine.

Mrs. Shain expressed a feeling of terror as she mounted the camel, which increased considerably as the beast rose to its feet, seemingly coming apart in the middle and re-coupling itself as it did so.

The salt mine experience became a lasting memory due to one wild ride down a slide cut into the salt itself.

"After I'd been given a shove and had gotten half-way down the incline, I realized the leather apron I had been given earlier was not to be worn at the front side of one's body," Mrs. Shain told her listeners.

Mrs. Shain's appearance before the group marked the 25th anniversary of its founding. She was one of the four women, new to Birmingham and trying to overcome a sense of loneliness, who organized the club.
