A combined freshman-sophomore football team of Cranbrook school defeated a squad from Hazel Park High School by a score of 34-7 last week. Cranbrook decisively outplayed Hazel Park as they scored in all but the second quarter of the game. Cranbrook's first tally came early in the first period when they scored on the first series of downs. Quarterback Dave Cooper scored from the four yard line, and Ozzie Jacobson plunged over carrying the extra point. The score remained unchanged as the teams left the field for the halftime.

On the opening kickoff of the third quarter, Dick Rosenthal, left halfback, ran the ball back for a score, while Bob Waddell went over for the extra point. Dave Cooper denied the Hazel Park end for his second touchdown of the game. The extra point was missed and the score stood at 20-0.

In the last quarter, the teams battled on even ground until Hazel Park finally broke into the scoring column by flicking on a pass play which covered 40 yards. The first team for Cranbrook returned with Dick Rosenthal back the kickoff. Fred Fecheimer caught a pass for the extra point and closed the scoring for the afternoon.

Cranbrook was aroused for the game against Hazel Park in an attempt to avenge the previous seven consecutive defeats against that team. By coincidence, it was this same Hazel Park team that defeated Rochester this year. Last week Rochester defeated this Cranbrook team by a score of 6-2.

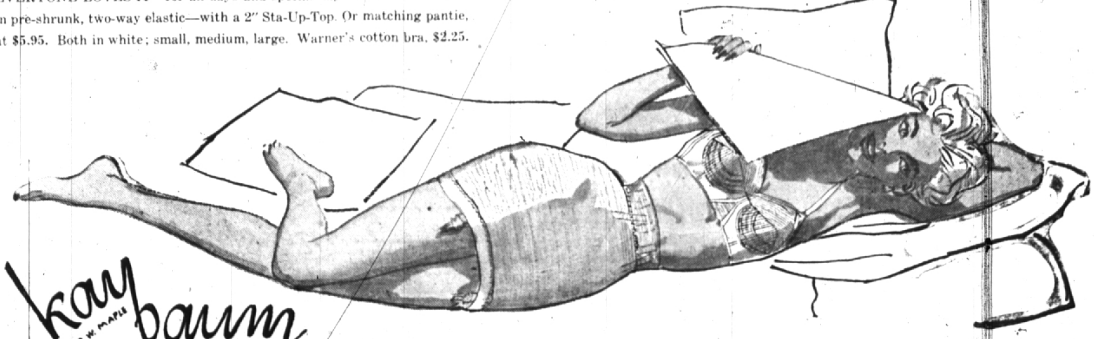
